Mr. Carter was sentenced to life imprisonment along with John Artis in 1967 for the slaying of three men in Paterson, N.J., on June 17, 1966. At the: time he was 29 years old and leading middleweight conа tender. The principal witnesses! in the case have since recanted their testimony, but Superior Court Judge Samuel A. Larner, who presided at the original trial, has refused to permit a reconsideration of the case. Mr. Carter, who has led the struggle for his own vindication and that of Mr. Artis, has since appealed to Governor Byrne of New Jersey for executive clemency.
